4	before we started. Is there anything I'm not gonna
5	mention that one thing, but anything else that we
6	talked about you don't want me to talk about?
7	MS. CLULEY: No.
8	FEMALE SPEAKE: Okay. Perfect. Okay. Okay.
9	So the first thing I'm gonna do is to make this all
10	official as a lawyer
11	MS. CLULEY: Uh-huh.
12	FEMALE SPEAKER: can you please raise your
13	right hand?
14	WHEREUPON,
15	DIANE CLULEY
16	called as a witness, having been first duly sworn, was
17	examined and testified as follows:
18	THE WITNESS: I do.
19	FEMALE SPEAKER: Thank you. You can put your
20	hand down.
21	EXAMINATION
22	BY FEMALE SPEAKER:
23	Q So we're gonna try to capture your testimony
24	today. And if you'll just say what your name is.
25	A My name is Diane Cluley and I'm a member of
	Page 2

1	Our Lady Queen of Peace Parish in Wichita Falls for 65
2	years.
3	Q You're a spring chicken.
4	A Yeah.
5	Q And you know Michael F. Olson, right?
6	A Yes, I do.
7	Q And when did you come to know him?
8	A In 1991 he was a seminarian here doing his
9	pastoral year. And we were at a parish picnic and he
10	walked over to our family and everything which
11	everybody does because there are six sons and they
12	were playing and they just usually gravitate toward
13	our family so, yeah.
14	Q Wow, that's wonderful.
15	A And we were happy to meet him.
16	Q And how can you describe your relationship
17	with him from the early days?
18	A Yeah. At that picnic he asked if he could
19	come over and I said, "Sure." And I this this
20	sounds kind of weird because you would normally not do
21	this. But, see, my husband, Ken, was a professional
22	baseball player. That was his life and everything and
23	he has six sons and they all they all were involved
24	in sports and everything.
25	So we always had young priests and

seminarians here. We were honored to have them. And
the Brothers of the Holy Cross from Notre Dame who
taught at Notre Dame they were always here for
refreshments in the afternoon so we didn't think it
was unusual at all that Michael wanted to come over
because he came over every day after that.

And so -- well, he would -- he would also go to the Sisters' house too because they understood he was -- he's a fearful and insecure young man. And he -- he needed the nurturing and he felt a lot of comfort. He'd sit here and watch baseball with my husband and my sons and everything and we all learned to just love him.

He -- he still was very insecure so the Sisters were wonderful to him. He -- he was afraid of our parish priest, Father Bill, and so he would go over there and the Sisters they understood that he needed somebody to listen to and they were wonderful and he would stay until about 6 o'clock.

And then 6 o'clock he would come here and he would eat supper or dinner with us and then stay till real late at night till Father went to bed. So and then he'd go -- he'd go home.

But we didn't -- we didn't mind this and we knew, you know, that it helped him through his fears

1	because he had a he had a lot of conflicts with his
2	parents.
3	Q Did he ever describe that his situation
4	with his parents to you?
5	A Yeah, he did. He said that there were times
6	when he had a lot of fears about going to sleep
7	because his father, excuse me, would come in and maybe
8	had been drinking and everything. And I know his
9	father is a really good man now and everything, but I
10	think Michael lived with a lot of insecurities and
11	fears.
12	And did you want me to tell you about the
13	incident at the ordination?
14	Q Sure.
15	A Okay. And, see, this is sort of the reason
16	he had conflicts. His mother, Jan, I loved her. She
17	was real sweet. They were both happy people and
18	everything and they visited with us and they had
19	dinner with us and they stayed with us.
20	But we as Michael's friends, fellow
21	seminarians, were ordained we went to every ordination
22	and we loved them. They were beautiful, just
23	beautiful. And one was in Corpus Christi.
24	And so we were at the end of the ordination.
25	We were at a dinner and it was the bishop was there

1	whoever the bishop of Corpus Christi was. But and
2	then all of the his friends, they were young
3	priests, and we were all standing around a table and
4	his mother just out of nowhere said, "Michael, I have
5	a picture of you on Halloween when you were about ten
6	years old dressed up as Hitler and trick-or-treating
7	the Jewish next-door neighbors."
8	And my husband, you know, was always a joker
9	and I told him not to laugh. Anyway, Michael was
10	horrified and he said, "Well," he said, "that's not
11	true."
12	And she said, "Yes, it is because I have a
13	picture of it." And I felt really sorry for him
14	because it was such a demeaning thing to say, you
15	know, to your young son who was sitting there with his
16	friends. But so I couldn't understand the conflicts
17	in their family, but there definitely were conflicts.
18	So but anyway, we yeah. We were very
19	involved with him. He became our close friend and
20	then after he was ordained we were thrilled and we
21	made a trip to Rome together. And the trip to Rome
22	was beautiful.
23	He had an uncanny way of contacting people.
24	Like there was this Monsignor Caputo who was the
25	liaison between the Pope and, I don't know, visiting

heads of state or something. And because he had been
in Houston when Michael was teaching at the semin
I mean, the school there, well, he had met Monsignor
Caputo. And Monsignor Caputo was here in Houston to
go to M.D. Anderson, okay, so they were friends.

So when we got to Rome it was so thrilling because we went to the back of the Vatican. We were allowed to go through the back doors and it was just — it was just beautiful because we were allowed to go into art museums that were not allowed to the public like Fra Angelico, Caravaggio, all the famous great artists.

And every morning -- every morning we stayed at a Sister's house, but it was a hotel too, and he'd come over and then we'd go walk to the Vatican and we'd have mass together. He said mass every morning not at the main alter, but at the side alters and I did the readings and it was just heavenly. It was just the ultimate of our Catholic faith it was so beautiful.

And then he'd come back, you know, and we'd have breakfast and he'd take us to every -- every beautiful church and tell us the stories behind them. He's very intelligent. It was -- it was just wonderful.

everything."

1	Then we'd come back to our room and he'd tell
2	us about St. Francis and then we'd go to Cesi with him
3	and everything so it was a beautiful time for us and
4	I'll never forget it.
5	And then then we traveled to Chicago with
6	him where his family was and everything and we met all
7	these beautiful priests who were wonderful. And I
8	said, "No wonder you wanted to become a priest. You
9	had such great examples in front of you." And they
10	were loving, giving priests. Priests with the people,
11	you know. They weren't pompous or anything.
12	Well, anyway, then we and then also we
13	went to St. Louis with him and we stayed with
14	Vincentian priests and they were wonderful. They were
15	wonderful.
16	He had a little some difficulties there
17	just with himself just and I don't really know
18	exactly what it was or anything. But he was happy
19	because Ken and I were there with him and so he was
20	you know, he was just close like a son.
21	And then he so anyway, we were just
22	thrilled when he called and he said, "I have something
23	exciting to tell you."
24	And I said, "Well, you know, it's so late and

1	And he said, "No, please. I've got I've
2	got to tell you." So we went over to Joey and
3	Lindsey's and he and he said he was a bishop and we
4	were just hugging him and crying and we were so
5	thrilled for him. And he just he it was all
6	wonderful.
7	Well, then all the sudden just sitting there
8	with him and this was almost immediate he said,
9	"Now the first thing I'm gonna do I'm gonna get rid of
10	the Marianist priests."
11	And I said, "What the ones at Nolan?"
12	He said, "Yeah."
13	And I said, "Why?"
14	And he said, "Well, you know, they're elderly
15	and they're getting ready to retire anyway."
16	And I said, "Well, are you gonna give them a
17	reception or anything?"
18	And he said, "No. Well, hell no. I'm I'm
19	gonna tell them they're out right now, kick them out."
20	And I was just so stunned I didn't know what
21	to say so I didn't say anything and the evening went
22	on. And then he said the Catholic Center is gonna be
23	closed.
24	And I said, "Why, Michael?"
25	And he said, "Well, hell, it's just a bunch

1	of women there." And he said, "A bunch of nuns."
2	I said, "But Bob and Deedee Schmidt, our good
3	friends, they go there for Bible studies, all the
4	people go there and that's also a book store and
5	everything."
6	He said, "Nah. It's gonna get closed."
7	So what I didn't know and one of the Sisters
8	told me later is that he went in and the Sister that
9	was in there said, "But, Father, I can't" he asked
10	her to leave and she said, "But I can't, Father,
11	without permission."
12	He said, "I said go."
13	And she said, "But I can't. I have to ask my
14	superior."
15	And he said, "I said go or get out of here,"
16	and then he started tearing down the posters in the
17	windows. And after I heard that I just I knew that
18	something was really, really wrong.
19	And, see, and one thing his anger at women
20	it's it's there and it's uncontrollable. And then
21	later on in phone calls he'd call the Sisters.
22	Q I know you don't want to say it, but they
23	need to know what he actually said.
24	A Call them aging lesbians and it just broke my
25	heart. And then he was laughing, laughing about
	Page 10

telling them they had to go.	And he became obsessed
with his power and he was	and then he his phone
calls for the past year were	violent. They were just
they were too much and they -	like he one time
okay.	

He tried to ca- -- there was -- okay. Let me go back just a little bit. He -- he had been the Rector at Holy Trinity Seminary for several years. He loved it there and we loved having him there because it's the only time I really ever saw him happy. And we'd go there some time and surprise him and go to mass and then go have breakfast with the seminarians and we just -- it was wonderful.

I told my boys that's the only time in my life I've ever seen him really happy. And, Michael, if you're listening you know this too. And you said that all will forget you and I told you, "No, they wouldn't. They wouldn't forget you because you were different from anybody that ever had. You took them to museums, you took them to the Ranger games, you took them everywhere and to operas even." And I said, "They loved you. They would never forget you."

But it -- it -- he -- when he left it just -- I don't know. It just broke his heart. So -- so this

1	young there's a young priest that went to the
2	seminarians after that and I don't know if he was a
3	Rector or not. I was too upset to call to ask any
4	questions after this.
5	It was a phone call and the phone calls
6	always were like, "Oh, when are you gonna bring Father
7	Isaac here?"
8	And he would say, "That"
9	Q Again, those terrible words.
10	A "God damn little troublemaker." And that
11	just I just I don't know, it just broke my
12	heart.
13	Q So that was Isaac Orozco?
14	A Uh-huh, yes.
15	Q So what did he call him? I'm sorry. I spoke
16	on top of you.
17	A God damn little troublemaker. And I said,
18	"Michael, you know, you know he doesn't have a family
19	backing him or anything." And anyway, there was no
20	use even talking to him. He was out of control.
21	In fact, all the all the telephone
22	conversations this past year were totally out of
23	control. They were cursing all the time, cursing
24	priests. Every other word was what I just said.
25	So then he tried to call Bishop Farrell who

1	was Bishop at Bishop at Dallas and to find
2	something out about this young priest who was either
3	visiting or he was the Rector. Like I said, I didn't
4	want to ask any more questions because the telephones
5	were the phone calls were just excruciating. They
6	were awful. They weren't him at all.
7	And so he said he wanted this priest
8	investigated so Bishop Farrell came over and he said
9	he saw nothing wrong. And then Michael would try to
10	call him again and he would and Bishop Farrell
11	finally quit answering his phone calls.
12	Q And Michael told you that?
13	A Yeah. He told me that. And he said he
14	cursed him, of course, and said I said, "But maybe
15	there wasn't anything."
16	And this is when he was so angry. He said
17	and he was on a retreat then. He said he talked
18	about how that priest should die and be tortured
19	first.
20	Q I need you to describe the type of torture.
21	Do you remember what he said?
22	A Yeah. One was encased in concrete. Anyway,
23	I'm I hate to even say this, but when I think of
24	all the good priests who've been ousted I know it's
25	the right thing to do.

1	But he was so violent with that about that
2	priest that I I started crying because, you know,
3	it was like at night and everything. And he just
4	sounded, I don't know, like somebody else was inside
5	of him or something.
6	But I was used to the cursing by then. I was
7	used to the way he cursed priests and the things he
8	said about them. But but
9	Q Was that was that new when he became a
10	bishop?
11	A Uh-huh. Oh, absolutely.
12	Q So when he was when he was ordained before
13	he was a bishop
14	A No, never.
15	Q did he curse?
16	A Huh-uh.
17	Q And after that is when he used what you said
18	the G-D word
19	A Yeah.
20	Q almost every sentence?
21	A Yep. Uh-huh.
22	Q Okay.
23	A That's and that's what, you know, made me
24	realize something there's something that's been
25	corrupted in this young man. But it was too much for
	Page 14

1	me that night. I couldn't just couldn't take it
2	anymore.
3	And when he hung up I called one of my sons
4	and I started crying. And I said, "Joey, I can't even
5	believe you wouldn't believe what I had to listen
6	to."
7	And he said, "Momma, don't answer the phone
8	at night."
9	So I said, "Joey, I know, but I already had
. 0	to hear all that."
.1	Well, so the next day wherever that retreat
. 2	was and, see, I didn't ask any questions. You
. 3	know, somebody said, "What was the priest's name?"
. 4	Why would I want to know the priest's name when I'm
.5	listening to how he was supposed to die? It's just it
۱6	was too much.
L 7	Anyway, and so what was I saying?
8 .	Q You were talking about the next day.
.9	A Oh, the next day he drove here and he came in
20	and I could hardly stand next to him. I feel so bad,
21	but I couldn't. And he went in and sat on the couch
22	and he said, "I'm sorry," and he looked awful. He
23	looked awful.
24	And I couldn't say it's okay. I just kind of
25	nodded and everything till he left. And anyway, after
	Page 15

1	that after that I when he would come here I
2	would say I was gone and so he would go to Joey's
3	house. Of course, he doesn't anymore. And I couldn't
4	go over there. I just couldn't anymore.
5	It wasn't that I was condemning him. I
6	wasn't. I was and I was afraid. It was just that
7	it was too much to see him like that. It was like
8	it was like somebody who was possessed, you know,
9	because this power corrupted him. He wasn't that way
10	before. He was never that way. He was totally
11	corrupted by this power.
12	And it started immediately. It wasn't
13	gradual. So maybe maybe that other Father O'Toole
14	was right. Maybe that's the way he always was inside.
15	I don't know, but it's affected everyone. It's
16	affected my grandkids, it's affected people who go to
17	mass.
18	We don't we don't have a priest anymore
19	that that, you know, that loved us and taken care
20	of us. Some of the grandkids say, "Why what is
21	there at church?" When I tell them the Body of Christ
22	they understand that. But they don't understand what
23	could happen to a person like Bishop Olson.
24	Q Before these phone calls was it did you
25	tell me earlier that he used to stay here when he came

1	to town?
2	A Well, he didn't spend the night here a lot.
3	He did when Ken was alive when my husband was, but
4	after that he would spend the night at Joey and
5	Lindsey's.
6	Q And that's
7	A My son.
8	Q your son's?
9	A Uh-huh.
10	Q And he was particularly close to Joey
11	A Yeah.
12	Q of your sons, right?
13	A Uh-huh. But, see, when he told me that he
14	was an alcoholic, well, that was okay. Like I said,
15	we have a son who has been sober for 19 years and he's
16	wonderful. He's helped thousands of people.
17	But when Eddie
18	Q When you say "he told me he was an alc-"
19	who told you who was an alcoholic?
20	A Michael told me he was.
21	Q Michael told you Michael was an alcoholic?
22	A Yeah. That he was.
23	Q Okay.
24	A And and but then when Eddie called him
25	once when after he had called about Father Keith,
	Page 17

1	you know, because he said he's one of us, I'm sending
2	him there. When Michael did.
3	Q Was that because he was an alcoholic
4	A Uh-huh.
5	Q or was it did he also say something
6	else that he was?
7	A No.
8	Q Did he ever tell you he was a homosexual?
9	A That Michael was?
LO	Q Yes.
l 1	A Oh, yeah.
12	Q Okay. Can you talk about that?
13	A Well, that was on one of our trips and it
l 4	was, like I said, late at night. And when he told me
L 5	that I said, "That's okay, Michael, you know."
16	Q Can you as best you remember say what he told
L 7	you about that?
l 8	A He just it was just a sentence. He said,
L 9	"Do you know that I'm an alcoholic I mean, a
20	homosexual?"
21	And I said, "Michael, that's all right." And
22	that was that was all. We didn't even discuss it.
23	I mean, it is all right. You know, I have nothing
2 4	maybe maybe that caused him shame or insecurities,
25	but it didn't me with him
	Page 18

1	Q Right.
2	A at all. It never would with me. They're
3	children of God. They just but anyway, that
4	Q And when he who is Eddie? You mentioned
5	Eddie.
6	A My second oldest son.
7	Q Okay.
8	A And when Eddie tried to call him and say,
9	hey, Brittany, this girl that his son was going with,
10	needs help. She needs some help. She needs a place.
11	Do you know of a recovery place anywhere near Fort
12	Worth because that's where they lived?
13	Never answered the call. So, see, he might
14	have been an alcohol and he claimed he went to
15	meetings and everything. He said he even did when he

9	Jeff Poirot?
LO	A Not well. We went to mass sometime and we
1	discussed getting together so we can trade stories

. 3	much. But the way I knew him was because I was so
4	upset with these phone calls from Michael that they
15	were and that I went to confession. I wanted to go
. 6	to confession to another church because we have this
. 7	little 30-year-old Indian priest here and, you know, I
.8	didn't want to bother him with this.
. 9	So so I went to and I didn't know who
20	was in the confessional because I went behind the
21	screen. I didn't want him to see who I was. Not that
2	he would know me. But anyway, I started telling him,
3	I said, you know, "This priest is a friend of ours and
24	always has been a good friend became elevated to a
25	different position." I didn't want to really point

Τ	the finger, you know, at the bishop and everything.
2	And I said, "And all of a sudden he's changed
3	so much that that we're worried about our parish.
4	People aren't were worried about the school." But
5	I said, "I'm mainly worried because every time he
6	calls me every phone call I don't care how awful they
7	are he always ends up with saying do you think I've
8	changed." And I said, "I never say, oh, no. I always
9	say, well, I know you have a lot of pressures now that
L O	you didn't have before."
l 1	And after this long pouring out of this I
12	heard this voice say, "You're not alone." It was
13	Father Jeff.
L 4	Q On the other side of the
15	A Uh-huh. I said
16	Q confessional screen?
17	A "What?" I was stunned.
18	And he said, "You're not alone." He said,
L 9	"Today he" this is Father Donohue who is a colonel
20	in the military with our good friend Father O'Toole
21	who is a colonel in the military. They served
22	together as a matter of fact. Both intelligent,
23	honorable men.
24	He told him he couldn't say mass anymore. He
25	wasn't a priest anymore when he turned 80. And when
	Page 21

1	Father Donohue said, "Well, why are you doing this to
2	me?"
3	And what I was told is Michael threw the
4	missile or whatever he had in his hand down on the
5	floor and stomped and said, "Because I can."
6	Q Do you believe that's what he would have
7	done?
8	A I do.
9	Q And what's that based on?
10	A I do. Huh?
11	Q Is that based on your personal observations
12	
13	A Uh-huh.
14	Q of him and his demeanor?
15	A Exactly. I believe it. So and so Father
16	Jeff helped me so much, though, because I said, "But,
17	Father Jeff, I'm worried because look at Father Isaac.
18	He didn't have a family to go back to."
19	And he said, "Do you know what he's doing
20	now? He's driving an Uber." The man with all the
21	intelligence, charisma who could have lead all these
22	people in our faith.
23	So the and he said, "You know what, the
24	next time you why don't you just say I do think
25	you've changed?" So I did.

1	Q And how did that go?
2	A Not well at all. He said, "I'm sorry I'm not
3	to your liking."
4	And I said, "Everything's wrong, Michael." I
5	said, "You're not the same, our school is in
6	shambles."
7	And he said, "I'm sorry the school is not in
8	your liking to your liking." And he said, "Good
9	bye and good afternoon."
10	So I go back to Father Jeff and I told him
11	what he said. And here's Father Jeff who doesn't even
12	know me, he said, "I'm so sorry he said that to you."
13	He's so wonderful.
14	Anyway, I said, "Father Jeff, you need to be
15	careful because" he said, "I have a pri I have
16	a Canon lawyer."
17	And I said, "Oh, thank God."

20	Q And do you know anything about whether the
21	bishop has tried to oust any priests?
22	A Yes.
23	Q And what do you know about that?
24	A Well, I know about Father Isaac Orozco.
25	Q And tell me what you know about that.

1	A Well, I just know that it was envy. He
2	Q And why do you say that?
3	A Because because he he was very
4	intelligent and because all of the seminarians liked
5	him and because all the people the people loved
6	him. And he was a protocol whatever the protocol
7	is guy that does things for Bishop Van and Bishop Van
8	loved him.
9	And so I know it was just envy because of the
10	way he why would he even curse him? He cursed him,
11	you know, like he was nothing and he was a man of God.
12	Q And how many times did you hear him curse
13	Isaac Orozco?
14	A Several times. I don't know how many times.
15	Maybe four or five, I don't know. I didn't count
16	them. But, see, the thing about it is these men were
17	called by God, not by the Pope or anybody. They were
18	called by God. And if you take their vocation away
19	from them that God had called them to then that's the
20	worst thing in the world anybody can do. You couldn't
21	do anything worse than that as a bishop.
22	Q And did he take Isaac Orozco's vocation away
23	from him?
24	A Yes. And Isaac Orozco right now can be
25	accepted back into the priesthood in New York. He
	Page 24

1	won't let him. He won't let him go. "He's mine,"
2	that's his usual saying. "He's mine."
3	Q Do you know anything else about any of the
4	other priests that may no longer be priests?
5	A Well, of course, Father Richard. I love him.
6	But
7	Q And that's Father Richard Kirkham?
8	A Kirkham, yes.
9	Q And what do you know about that?
10	A Well, I just know that when he was in Burke
11	everybody there loved him. Everybody knew him,
12	everybody loved him. Well, so when he was there,
13	well, we would always ask him to come say the
14	children's masses at Notre Dame School. The children
15	fell in love with him. All of us did.
16	So we kept saying to each other, "Don't brag
17	about him, don't say anything good about him because
18	then he'll be gone." But we thought we didn't
19	think this was seriously happening. We thought maybe,
20	but we didn't realize what we know now.
21	Q So tell me about why you would say "then
22	he'll be gone".
23	A Because he's jealous of anybody that the
24	people love.
25	Q When you say "he" you mean Michael Olson?
	Page 25

1	A Michael Olson was envious of anybody who
2	and this is why Father Richard's having such a hard
3	time. He's never been no no priest congregation
4	has ever supported or gone against the bishop or
5	saying, no, we don't we want him back. No one has
6	had the nerve to do it.
7	His supporters Father Richard's have and
8	that's why he's so angry with him and brought all the
9	false accusations against him.
10	Q Has he have you ever talked to Bishop
11	Olson about the accusations about Father Richard at
12	all?
13	A No. We quit speaking when before that
14	happened. I don't answer the phone anymore.
15	Q Does he still continue to call?
16	A As of this past two or three weeks, no.
17	Q Okay. Before then were there any other
18	priests that you guys suspected might have a problem
19	the Bishop might have a problem with?
20	A Oh, yes.
21	Q And would those be?
22	A Father O'Toole who is 82. And he as I
23	said, he was a colonel in the military. And Father
24	well, he and yeah. And he and Father Donohue.
25	But, see, he told Father O'Toole that if you if you
	Page 26

1	say anything, you know, you're gone.
2	Well, so then just before he left the last
3	time, I don't know where he went, he sent the Vicar
4	General, Father Hart, Monsignor Hart, to tell Father
5	O'Toole you don't you don't say anything. You
6	don't say anything against the Bishop or you don't say
7	that things aren't right because if you are you've
8	lost your priesthood.
9	And so Father O'Toole
10	Q And how did you how did you learn that?
11	A Oh, I talk to Father O'Toole almost every
12	day.
13	Q So Father O'Toole I want to make sure I
14	understood that. Monsignor Hart came and brought a
15	message from the Bishop
16	A Uh-huh.
17	Q to Father O'Toole saying
18	A Exactly.

CLULEY: Yes, because he was at a 9 retreat, I didn't know that, and it was 9:30 at night 10 and he was raging and when he was telling me about 11 this priest that was at the seminary and I don't know 12 if the priest was the rector, I don't think so, but I 13 -- maybe he was, I didn't bother to ask because I was 14so shocked. But -- but he knew that this priest, that 15 the seminarians there liked him and he said he drinks 16 with them all the time. And I said, well, how do you 17 know and he said, I just know, I have tried to tell 18 Bishop Ferrell this and he doesn't believe me. 19 fact he came over to investigate and said there was 20 nothing wrong and Michael said, when Bishop Ferrell 21 said there was nothing wrong and he quit answering the 22 phone and Michael said, he thought that was -- that 23 wasn't right that Bishop Ferrell should've been 24 answering the phone. But obviously he saw nothing to, 25

1	you know, to be afraid of, but so then Michael Started
2	telling me how he hated this priest and then he said,
3	I would like I wish he could die and then he
4	started telling me the different ways that he wanted
5	him to die and there are a lot of different ways, but
6	the only thing I can remember was being buried in
7	concrete and I was by that time I was so shaken, I
8	couldn't wait to get off the phone.
9	MS. BENOLKEN: And so he didn't mention other
10	that he wanted him to be tortured before he died,
11	right?
12	MS. CLULEY: Yes.
13	MS. BENOLKEN: And he mentioned several
14	different ways, is that right? Isn't that what you
15	told me just a little while ago?
16	MS. CLULEY: Yeah, yes.
17	MS. BENOLKEN: And you've blocked out those
18	from you memory, I can imagine being so hurtful.
19	MS. CLULEY: I can't remember, no.
20	MS. BENOLKEN: But you do know that he did
21	mention other ways in addition to that?
22	MS. CLULEY: Absolutely.
23	MS. BENOLKEN: Okay. I also was a little bit
24	unclear last time that we were talking, you were
25	talking about someone who is now driving an Uber. I
	Page 9

1	just want to clarify who that was.
2	MS. CLULEY: Father Isaac Orozco (ph).
3	MS. BENOLKEN: And was Father Isaac Orozco
4	the man that you are saying had all the intelligence,
5	charisma, who could've led all these people and their
6	faith from the diocese.
7	MS. CLULEY: Yes. Uh-huh. We met Father
8	Isaac in Rome. Then he was young, in his 20s. He was
9	fluent in six languages and he was just up and coming
10	wonderful priest, but and Michael knew that he
11	didn't have parents background, you know, with his
12	parents because they were really troubled and his
13	brother was too. And so I was hoping and then it
14	ended up he was very close to Bishop Van (ph), he was
15	the protocolled person who traveled with him
16	everywhere.
17	MS. BENOLKEN: So when you said you met him
18	in Rome, was that when you were traveling with
19	Michael?
20	MS. CLULEY: Uh-huh. Yes.
21	MS. BENOLKEN: I am going to move on to
22	another area that I didn't flush out very well. It
23	was when Monsignor Hart (ph) came to Father O'Toole to
24	tell to bring a message from the Bishop, I messed
25	that up and I thought it would be best if I just let
	Page 10

1	you tell what that was. And that was letent, collect:
2	MS. CLULEY: It was recent, but it also
3	happened in the past too when Michael first started
4	all of this, you know, telling the priest that he
5	could take away their vocations. So there were two
6	times with Father O'Toole when he sent Father Hart to
7	tell Father O'Toole that if he opened his mouth and
8	told him anything about the Bishop, that he was gone,
9	he wouldn't be a priest anymore.
10	MS. BENOLKEN: If he told who about the
11	Bishop, he told?

19	MS. BENOLKEN: So did Father O'Toole ask
20	Michael why he did it to
21	MS. CLULEY: Yeah, because they were, yes.
22	MS. BENOLKEN: That's what I am missing.
23	MS. CLULEY: I'm sorry.
24	MS. BENOLKEN: So can you explain that to me?
25	MS. CLULEY: Okay. Father Donohue and Father
	Page 11

1	O'Toole were both coloners in the military, they were
2	Chaplains and so what started, it was Father Donohue
3	that Michael had decided that he was going to tell him
4	he was no longer a priest and that he couldn't say
5	mass anymore. And so Father O'Toole felt that a duty
6	that he should say, but I know him, you know, he has
7	an impeccable carrier, he was a wonderful person and
8	served all these years, nothing there was nothing,
9	you know, to be well, anyway, so Michael so he -
10	- when he tried to do that, Michael got real mad, the
11	Bishop got real mad.
12	MS. BENOLKEN: So Father O'Toole went to
13	Michael and asked about the other priest?
14	MS. CLULEY: He actually wrote him a letter.
15	MS. BENOLKEN: Okay.
16	MS. CLULEY: Because he called me and read
17	the letter to me and I said, you better not send that
18	and he better send one that's a little not quite as
19	scathing because then you are next and he said, oh I
20	know, so he he did he did another letter, but it
21	didn't make any difference to the Bishop.
22	MS. BENOLKEN: So he was in the letter asking
23	the Bishop why he did what he did or challenging him
24	on.
25	MS. CLULEY: Well well, just saying I know
	Page 12

1	him, I know what a fine person he is. I have to tell
2	you that I wouldn't feel right, not recommending, not
3	taking up for him or saying what a good person he is
4	and of course that made the Bishop real angry.
5	MS. BENOLKEN: Okay. So after the Bishop got
6	that letter, Monsignor Hart came to visit Father
7	O'Toole?
8	MS. CLULEY: Uh-huh.
9	MS. BENOLKEN: Is that right?
10	MS. CLULEY: Yes.
11	MS. BENOLKEN: Is that yes?
12	MS. CLULEY: Yes.
13	MS. BENOLKEN: And so then what is your
14	understanding of the message that Monsignor Hart
15	brought to Father O'Toole at that time?
16	MS. CLULEY: That if he didn't keep his mouth
17	shut and quit defending Father O'Toole that he was the
18	next to go, he would be the next one to leave.
19	MS. BENOLKEN: I may have misheard you, but
20	this Monsignor Hart came to Father O'Toole.
21	MS. CLULEY: Father O'Toole.
22	MS. BENOLKEN: And said if he doesn't quit
23	defending.
24	MS. CLULEY: Father Donohue.
25	MS. BENOLKEN: Father Donohue, okay, I heard
	Page 13

1	Father O'Toole, so I might've misheard. Okay. And
2	was there another time that the Bishop sent a message
3	to Father O'Toole that you know?
4	MS. CLULEY: The day before he was called to
5	Rome he sent Father Hart again to say, while I am gone
6	you are not to say anything and I don't know what he
7	meant by that, but he told Father O'Toole, you are not
8	to say anything, you are not to tell anything. The
9	only thing I think he might have meant is, see, when
10	Michael was first ordained, he was in Bedford at St.
11	Michaels and Father O'Toole was the parish priest. So
12	he was his assistant, so he knew a lot. They served a
13	whole year together. So I don't know what he meant by
14	that, but it was a threat just before he was called to
15	Rome.
16	MS. BENOLKEN: Just this month?
17	MS. CLULEY: Yes, yeah.
18	MS. BENOLKEN: Just this month. Where does
19	Father O'Toole live?
20	MS. CLULEY: In Bedford.
21	MS. BENOLKEN: Okay.
22	MS. CLULEY: I have his address and phone
23	number if you want it.
24	MS. BENOLKEN: Well, I might need to get that
25	one. So, and thank you for clarifying that because I
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1	didn't I didn't do a good job on that. So moving
2	on to, you talked about when the Bishop Bishop
3	Olson talks about the priest, he uses the phrase, he
4	is mine, he is mine. Just a little bit ago we were
5	talking about another instance where he said that
6	about someone you know, do you remember who that was?
7	MS. CLULEY: Michael Edghill, our principal.
8	MS. BENOLKEN: And what does he say what
9	does Michael Olson say about Michael Edghill?
10	MS. CLULEY: He says he is mine.
11	MS. BENOLKEN: And what does he mean by that?
12	MS. CLULEY: Which means whatever he does,
13	whatever he like the children's masses, the music
14	even has changed to where they say hymns from the 50s
15	and 60s and
16	MS. BENOLKEN: And is that at Michael Olson's
17	direction?
18	MS. CLULEY: That's what Michael Edghill
19	tells us because Mrs. Parker, the choir director,
20	is a lovely person and we asked her why the children
21	don't sing children's songs anymore and she said, they
22	are not allowed to because the Bishop doesn't want
23	them to. So when somebody asks them, Michael, can't
24	he change and he said, no, this the Bishop wants
25	the children to sing the Latin hymns and that's all
	Dago 15

1	right for Latin hymns, but these are ancient ones, you
2	know. And so so it ends up being that we they
3	have to have permission from the Bishop for the songs
4	that they sing, they can't even walk up on the alter
5	on Halloween, when it is All Saints and they have
6	their little costumes on and sing when the saints go
7	marching and he said that wasn't appropriate.
8	MS. BENOLKEN: And they used to be able to do
9	that.
10	MS. CLULEY: All the time.
11	MS. BENOLKEN: Okay. I also was a little bit
12	unclear, we were talking about whether Michael had a
13	psychiatrist or a therapist. What do you know about
14	that?
15	MS. CLULEY: Well, he has always told me that
16	he had a therapist that he talked to all of his life,
17	all the time that I have known him, he has.
18	MS. BENOLKEN: And what about a psychiatrist.
19	MS. CLULEY: You know, I really truly don't.
20	I kind of thought that's what it was, but I am not
21	sure.
22	MS. BENOLKEN: Okay.
23	MS. CLULEY: I mean, he wasn't ashamed of it
24	or embarrassed of it at all, but it didn't seem to
25	help him.
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1	MS. BENOLKEN: Well, I just want to clear
2	clear it up.
3	MS. CLULEY: No, I'm sorry.
4	MS. BENOLKEN: Whoever it was. And then I
5	was talking to you last time about corresponding with
6	the Bishop and you were saying about what your letters
7	to him, but I forgot to follow up about it, did he
8	ever write to you?
9	MS. CLULEY: All the time. We had a lot of
10	correspondence from him and after he became a Bishop,
11	well, he came by here and he said, "do you have my
12	correspondence", I said, "well, yeah, you know I do,
13	there is a whole bag of it" and he said "well, I need
14	to look through it" and I said "oh okay" and so he
15	he read through every letter, everything and then took
16	some and threw them away and then the one the
17	one of the ones he threw was just back and forth
18	between one of my daughters-in-law about Sam and he
19	happened to say the word.
20	MS. BENOLKEN: Just spell it, you can spell
21	it.
22	MS. CLULEY: S-H-I-T happens and I said,
23	"Well Michael that's all right" I mean, that's just a
24	saying and he said, oh he was he was real abrupt and
25	serious he started tearing up those things. So I
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1	ended up just throwing them all in the trash, but he
2	took what he wanted.
3	MS. BENOLKEN: So he retrieved his
4	correspondence.
5	MS. CLULEY: He did. Uh-huh.
6	MS. BENOLKEN: Did you did you find that
7	unusual?
8	MS. CLULEY: No, to me it was Michael. It
9	was always about him. Everything was always about
10	him. If you are talking to him on the phone, he he
11	pulls over on the side of the road and reads his last
12	three sermons. If you ask him about somebody there
13	that you are worried about who is ill, it is always
14	how it affected him. I have asked him to two of my
15	friends and he thought they were his real good friends
16	too, Caroline Stuttered (ph). And Margie Frazer were
17	both dying at this time and I called and they said,
18	they called and asked me to please just see if he
19	would come by and anoint them, you know, because one
20	was in down and it was close him and he never did even
21	go by and see them.
22	MS. BENOLKEN: Was he Bishop by then?
23	MS. CLULEY: Uh-huh.
24	MS. BENOLKEN: Is that a yes?
25	MS. CLULEY: Yes, but it was always about
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1	him, always. It was always about Michael, it was
2	never about anybody else. I've never had him call and
3	say, we need to pray for so and so because they were
4	ill, they had cancer or anything. It's always pray
5	for me.
6	MS. BENOLKEN: Well, speaking of
7	correspondence, was there some correspondence that
8	your husband started with him that you think kind of -
9	- might shed some light on some of this?
10	MS. CLULEY: Yeah, now, I do think that we
11	we didn't think that was weird at the time, but my
12	husband is just a practical joker and so he knew that
13	Michael like to be adored or whatever, but so he
14	started he had our little granddaughter, Amy, write
15	this letter. She is eight years old and said, "dear
16	Father Michael, I just want you to know that you are
17	the most wonderful priest I have ever heard and I just
18	love the Chicago Cubs, even though I know you", she
19	went on and on about the White Sox and the Cubs to try
20	to make it authentic and then and he had my little
21	granddaughter write it and my little granddaughter
22	said, "papa, we shouldn't be doing this to a priest"
23	and of course my husband just laughed about it.
24	So he would get he would put this letter
25	on the bus to Fort Worth and so it was postmarked

1	Forth Worth when it got to Michael. But this
2	correspondence went on because we got the letters from
3	Michael too on the bus and he would say how he was so
4	glad that she thought he was such a good priest and
5	everything and my husband always signed it, Esther
6	Green, I don't know. But it kind of got out of hand
7	because then when we read the other letters, we read
8	that he was writing back so often. Well, so finally I
9	said, "Ken, you can't do this anymore, you need to
.0	tell Michael that you know what this is", this is just
1	before he was Bishop though, just before. And now he
2	said, "no huh-uh" and he said, "you know we are going
L 3	to keep on with this". So I finally had to tell him,
L 4	I said, "Michael did you know notice anything about
L 5	the return address on the envelope" and he said "no"
۱6	and I said "well, this this little girl that you
L 7	write to, Ken had put his address as Chicago".
18	MS. BENOLKEN: Michael's address?
L 9	MS. CLULEY: Michael's address on his house,
20	but not of course not he put Forth Worth, but it
21	was Michael's address and Michael still didn't get and
22	I said, "Michael, you got to understand, Ken is
23	playing a joke or something" and there was a long
24	pause and a little bit of anger and "oh I knew it all

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the time". You know, it never did occur to us until

1	later, what was he carrying on conversation with an 8
2	year old girl for. And then at his ordination as
3	Bishop, well, Joey and Lindsay and I thought it would
4	be real funny to write the last little note and signed
5	it Esther Green. So we sent David LaPoint (ph) and
6	another seminarian with this little message and it
7	never came back. I think the Bishop threw it in the
8	trash.
9	MS. BENOLKEN: Oh heavens.
10	MS. CLULEY: Of course Ken thought that was
11	funny.
12	MS. BENOLKEN: So was Ken still alive once
13	the Bishop or once Michael Olson became Bishop.
14	MS. CLULEY: No.
15	MS. BENOLKEN: So he passed just before that
16	happened.
17	MS. CLULEY: Yeah.
18	MS. BENOLKEN: So he never Ken never know
19	him as Bishop.
20	MS. CLULEY: No.
21	MS. BENOLKEN: And that's and he did do
22	Michael Olson did Ken's funeral for you, the service?
23	MS. CLULEY: He did Ken's funeral and my
24	sister's funeral and my brothers, who neither one were
25	catholic. But we had a beautiful funeral for both of
	Page 21

1	them here at Our Lady Queen of Peace, but again it was
2	all about Michael.
3	MS. BENOLKEN: Anomaly and everything. Well,
4	you talked to me before about a 30 year old Indian
5	Priest that was part of what we have discussed. And I
6	want to switch to the topic of Indian Priest in the
7	Fort Worth Diocese. Have you had any conversations
8	with Michael about that?
9	MS. CLULEY: Well, he he always defends
10	and the only one he doesn't defend is Father Sojan
11	(ph) who is in the cathedral now and that is because
12	Father Sojan was the only priest we knew from India
13	who who somehow he had this charisma and he was
14	just he brought people together. He made our
15	parish the happiest it has ever been and of course
16	when he became real popular like that, we knew that it
17	was just a matter of time before he went because

19	MS. BENOLKEN: And so Father Sojan went to
20	MS. CLULEY: The cathedral.
21	MS. BENOLKEN: And the Bishop moved him
22	there, right?
23	MS. CLULEY: Uh-huh.
24	MS. BENOLKEN: Is that a yes?
25	MS. CLULEY: Yes.
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1	MS. BENOLKEN: Thank you. What about has
2	Michael ever said anything about other Indian priests
3	waiting to come over?
4	MS. CLULEY: Just that he really loved them.

8	told us that there were 400 Indian priests who are
9	waiting to come over.

14	Alex, I am sure, is a good person and everything, but
15	he was 30 years old. He had never he had just come
16	out of seminary in India. He had no experience at all
17	as a priest. Maybe if he had gone to one of the
18	little surrounding area, towns and everything, it
19	would have been alright. But but he sent him to
20	and I think this was deliberate, he sent him to our
21	huge perish and he didn't the first sermon he gave,
22	he didn't even know what to say, he said, "I don't
23	really know what to say, I guess, I will tell you a
24	little bit about my life". And he is a sweet person
25	and everything, but to me the Bishop did this on
	Page 23

T	purpose. he did this on purpose because he punished -
2	- he punished not only the priest, but he punished the
3	parishioners. He couldn't stand it when we had great
4	crowds and good music and all this love and getting
5	together, none of the parishioners are that way
6	anymore, all of us are suffering.
7	MS. BENOLKEN: What do you what do you
8	attribute that to?
9	MS. CLULEY: To the instability of the Bishop
LO	to thinking that that he has the power to punish
l 1	all of us in some way, that's what he is doing, he is
12	punishing all of us.
13	MS. BENOLKEN: Have you ever talked to him
14	about it?
15	MS. CLULEY: No, the last time I talked to
16	him, I told him, you know, a few things of what I
L 7	in a good way about what I thought about the church
L 8	and I told him, I wish that he was the way he used to
L 9	be and he was very angry.
20	MS. BENOLKEN: Is there anything about that
21	conversation that you think would be helpful for the -
22	- for Rome to hear?
23	MS. CLULEY: Which conversation?
24	MS. BENOLKEN: The last conversation that you
25	just referred to.

1	MS. CLULEY: Well, he just said, "I am sorry,
2	I am not to your liking anymore" and he said "good
3	afternoon and good bye" because that was the first
4	time that I had told him the truth, that I had said
5	"Michael, we are all suffering, our church is

7	here anymore" and he didn't care at all. He was just
8	angry because I accused him of that, so.
